OPRFC Preseason Update 2019

The OPRFC kicked off their sixth season at Level 6 in September. Behind the scenes, Simon Jukes stepped down to concentrate on his teaching commitments and was replaced as Forwards Coach by Adam Preocanin. Adam is also a coach at National 1 side Old Elthamians and previously coached at OPs for the 2016-17 season.

Preseason featured two squad games against local sides, giving the OPs opportunity to provide game time to plenty of players, including 12 recent leavers, which is a great sign for the future. A 33-10 win against newly formed Ealing 1871 (the men's amateur side) was followed by a 36-12 victory against Grasshoppers under the lights on Friday 30th August.

As is often the case, weddings and availability caused havoc in September as the season kicked off. The OPs were on the end of some chastening away losses at Harpenden and semi-pro Southend whilst a home loss to Amersham and Chiltern showed some promise but was undermined by uncharacteristic errors. Towards the end of the month, performances picked up with a 57-5 victory over local rivals Ruislip marking the first win of the season. It was a good team performance with Captain Joe Wellings (OP 2010) scoring two tries in

the effort. On the 5th October, the OPs managed to follow this up with a hard fought 32-24 win away at Woodford. A young OP side, featuring 18 year old Luis Gomez-Rose (OP 2019), who confirmed the win with a late try. Jono Moore (OP 2010) worked the ball to Aristide Goualin (OP 2008) who scorched up the touch line before passing inside to returning Captain Alex Ozegovic (OP 2012) for the crucial score.

Most pleasingly, the club has already played three 2nd team fixtures, as we continue to re-build the depth and consistency of the 2nd XV. The two league games resulted in narrow losses, 20-19 against Hammersmith and Fulham and a late, heart-breaking loss, 34-32, in Hackney against Old Streetonians. The third game, a friendly with Ealing 1871 2nd XV however was a morale-boosting 22-18 win with the Porter brothers, Dan (OP 2008) and James (OP 2016), inspiring the side.

From the Headmaster

It has been another superb year at St Benedict's, packed with inspiring events, opportunities and achievements.

This summer we had the best set of top grades at A level for 6 years: 42.2% of results were A*-A grades. More than 80% of our sixth form leavers gained places at their first choice universities, with five taking up Oxbridge places this year.

The GCSE results were also very pleasing, with 58.3% of exams graded 9-7 (A*-A), and 36.9% at 9-8 (A*). Nine students achieved straight 9/8 grades, and 27 of them, almost a quarter of the year group, achieved straight 9-7 grades.

We have had a series of excellent talks: visiting speakers have included Professor Bijan Modarai (OP 1992), a cardio-vascular surgeon; Professor Francis Campbell, vice chancellor of St Mary's University Twickenham; historian Michael Wood; Professor John Sloboda (OP 1968), who gave the Richard Baker Science Lecture; and Lord Patten (OP 1962), guest of honour at Prize Giving.

The co-curricular life of the school is as vibrant as ever. The Duke of Edinburgh's award scheme

is thriving, with 189 awards this year, and CCF recruitment is burgeoning, thanks to an exciting schedule of exercises and competitions. The Sports Department continues to train and play fixtures against a range of top schools: successes have included the U12 girls' Middlesex Hockey Tournament win, while the 1st VII won the Middlesex U18 Rugby 7s plate. In fencing, St Benedict's won the London Quadrangular, an annual tournament for the four best fencing schools in London. Music and Drama have been as impressive as ever, with a remarkable production of Les Misérables, and an outstanding concert at St John's Smith Square, with Mozart's Haffner Symphony, Requiem and Clarinet Concerto on the programme. Finally, St Benedict's Day was a wonderful celebration of our Benedictine ethos. Bishop Peter Doyle, Bishop of Northampton, was Principal Celebrant at Mass, and pupils raised well over £8000 for four charities: The Passage, Mary's Meals, Aid to the Church in Need and Papyrus.

Thank you to all OPs for your continued support.

The next phase of the School's development includes the installation of floodlights at the Perivale Playing Fields. This project will greatly enrich the sporting and outdoor opportunities of our students. The floodlights will also have a very positive effect in the wider community allowing longer training and development opportunities for our local sports clubs including our alumni clubs the OPRFC and OPCC.

My sincere thanks to all Old Priorians who generously supported these appeals.

A Brief History of St Benedict's Library

St Benedict's Library has been located in one of the schools most impressive rooms since 1957, displaying high ceilings, oak panelled walls and handcrafted English oak furniture, made by the famous Robert Thompson. The main library boasts a bank of east facing windows that ensures the room is bathed in early morning sunlight and is bright and airy throughout the day.

As the Senior Librarian, I have been interested in the history of the library since taking up position in 2016. I began researching in 2017, using the library's collection of 'Priorian' magazines to discover the history and evolution of the libraries over the years. From the first edition in 1927, up until present day, there have been various incarnations of the Libraries at St Benedict's. This history and development has provided a fascinating insight into the life of St Benedict's over the schools more than hundred-year history.

The Early Senior School Library

The Senior School Library was mentioned in the very first edition 'The Priorian' in 1927, with the Librarian listed as J. O'Connor. The library was initially stocked through book donations, receiving from several kind donors, many detective novels and light books. In 1939, the Senior Library was only available for use by Prefects and Sixth Formers.

In the 1940s, the Senior Library was initially located on the first floor of the Eastdown building. In 1950, a liberal supply of magazines and journals were provided to encourage interest in current affairs. After installing bookcases, the library was set with an extensive collection of some 200 books on loan.



The Memorial Library

Under the Headship of Dom Bernard Orchard (1945-1960), the Senior Library was given real focus and investment, using the War Memorial Fund raised in the late 1940s. Dom Bernard provided the provision of a proper and permanent library for the use of the senior boys.

In 1954, work began on building the third floor of the classroom block along Eaton Rise for the new Senior Library. The architect, John E. Sterrett, FRIBA, was employed again to complete the block. There are various reports of the library building project in The Priorian. In March 1957, the Senior School library was opened, boasting a splendid room, furnished with chairs and tables, handmade by Robert Thompson Craftsmen Ltd. To formally open the Library, named the 'Memorial Library', the Right Rev. B.C. Butler, OSB was invited as guest speaker, he announced to students, parents and friends, "I declare open this Memorial Library, dedicated to the memory of those Old Boys who gave their lives for their Country in the First and Second World Wars."

The Gerard Library

In 1962, an additional library was added below the Memorial Library to accommodate the Middle School. This was run by Lower fifth pupils and called The Gerard Library, in memory of Dom Gerard Hayes, Headmaster in 1960. A new room was added to the Memorial Library in 1967. This room came to be known as the 'Reading Room', it held the book stacks, and was where the Librarian worked. It is now called the eLearning room and contains a suite of computers where various lessons occur.

The Library in the Twenty-First Century

In 2012, under Librarian Diane Maxton and Assistant Librarian Argentina Barreto, the main library was extended into what used to be the Science Demonstration Room. This room became the Middle School Book Room and is designated for students in years Form 3 to Upper Fourth as a space for encouraging reading for pleasure. Kristabelle Williams Pearce took over as Librarian from 2014 to 2016, before I took up post in September 2016. Today, the Senior School Library holds over fifteen thousand books, numerous computers and is open to all. The impressive Robert 'Mousey' Thompson furniture is still used today. We hope to continue celebrating the history of St Benedict's library and ensure that it is central to pupil's enjoyment, learning and studies at St Benedict's now and into the future!

The Dorabros 2.0 - Our Story So Far

It's less than 100 days to go until we set off on our adventure across the Atlantic!

What a year it has been, following months of planning, training courses and sponsorship meetings, the Dorabros kicked off their campaign when Lirim and James ran the Marathon Des Sables.

On the 5th April, we set off to take on the world's toughest footrace, a 251km running race across the Sahara Desert that requires competitors to complete a gruelling six marathons in five days. Everything the Sahara had to offer, including the largest blister the race doctor had ever seen, could not slow them down and the boys smashed it out of the park.

Next, it was the May Ball, unbeknownst to us this may have been the hardest challenge of the year. We wanted to bring together all our supporters and create a truly memorable evening - we think we may have just succeeded on that front! The challenges of organising dinner for over 300 guests and all of our raffle and auction prizes was completely worth it to see everyone's enjoyment. We raised a huge amount of money for Teenage Cancer Trust and we would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has supported us and every single guest that made the May Ball such a special evening.

Our third challenge was a trans-European cycle ride. We flew out to Monaco in May and met one of our sponsors, Y.Co Superyacht Company. We embarked across the south coast of France and after a few days turned northward and set our sights on home. In nine days we covered over 1500 km and had the best time taking in everything France had to offer us, we arrived to a warm reception at Y.Co London with nothing but happy memories of our cycle.



Since then, we have been hard at work on our boat and in the sea preparing for our final two challenges. On Sunday 22nd September, we set off for Dover, pencilled in to kick off our swim across the Channel on Monday 23rd; 21 miles of water separates us from France - jellyfish, seasickness and the world busiest shipping lane stand in our way, but our preparations, largely thanks to Ralph Crane and Fiducio stand us in good stead and we are excited to attack the swim.

After that, we are on the countdown to Sunday 3rd November. When our boat is shipped to La Gomera, the start line of the Talisker Whisky Atlantic Challenge in December. We have completed our mandatory training hours and love spending time out on our boat. Once our boat is shipped, we will focus on the charity. We are having a leaving party in Ealing on Saturday 23rd November before we depart for the biggest challenge of our lives on Sunday 1st December.

Everything we are doing is in aid of the Teenage Cancer Trust. We are aiming to raise a £100,000 to finance and support a new treatment unit at the UCLH Macmillan Cancer Centre in London. We regularly visit the Hospital, where we spend time with the young people taking on the biggest challenge of their lives. In the Spotlight - Karis Halsall

When I first started at St Benedict's in 2003, A Level Drama wasn't even one of my chosen subjects. I couldn't make the timetable work and my dad, who some of you may know as Mr Halsall (a very long serving and very loud member of staff) wasn't too keen on me doing two 'artsy' subjects - I took Art as well. I chose Government and Politics instead, I'd always fancied myself as a bit of a voice of the people/revolutionary - if I could understand the inner workings of politics, maybe I could change things? Ah, the naivety of youth!

Several weeks in, it became very apparent that Government and Politics and I were just not going to see eye to eye, I went to the Head of Sixth Form, Miss MacTaggart and switched to Drama. In a strange way, I have (what I perceived as) the desperately boring minutiae of the British Governmental system to thank for my current career.

After a particularly successful final piece, where we directed/devised a contemporary retelling of Othello, I decided that I wanted to go to Drama School to study to be a Theatre Director. I was accepted into the prestigious Royal Central School of Speech and Drama. We had a compulsory writing module, which was headed up by the brilliant screenwriter and playwright Rebecca Lenkiewicz. Rebecca encouraged me to submit my first script to the Royal Court Young Writer's programme. On the merit of this, I was selected to take part in the programme, then immediately fast tracked to the Invitation Only group. Less than a year later, I was asked to join the "Super group" of writers alongside Nick Payne, Alia Bano, Penny Skinner, EV Crowe and Anya Reiss. It was an incredible experience and ignited my passion for playwriting.

Between 2009 and 2013, I steadily grew my portfolio with several short pieces and rehearsed readings commissioned, developed and performed at the Hampstead Theatre, The Old Red Lion, Theatre 503, Hightide Festival, Headlong, the Bush Theatre and Nabokov. In my first 'commercial' success I was commissioned to co-write the anti-FGM piece 'Little Stitches', which toured various theatres in London in summer 2014. In 2014, I established my own theatre company, Luminary Theatre and in 2016 we had great success with HYSTERICAL, a dark comedy exploring mental health, in collaboration with HOAX, a female clowning company. HYSTERICAL previewed at the VAULT Festival, and won the People's Choice Award. It went on to tour the South East, including Brighton Fringe.

This career path has been anything but easy. After three very intense and tough years at Drama School, I graduated in 2009 - straight into a recession. Once again, I found the British Government influencing my

career. The change of Government in 2010 brought serious cuts to the arts budgets. Consequently, many literary departments and new writing initiatives vanished or downsized, and theatres started taking less risks, which meant newer talent was side-lined for older, more established work that would put bums on seats. Not ideal when you're trying to forge a career as an unknown writer! All of the work I've made in the last 10 years has been crowdfunded as it's now near impossible to get Arts Council funding. Another big challenge has been that women's writing only makes up 28% of plays performed on British stages yearly, despite there being just as many women writing as men. Believe it or not, that's an improvement. It was 17% when I started. Another challenge is staying positive. Rejection is a huge part of this career, and you have to learn to make peace with it and not take it personally, even when the work feels like you're bearing your soul. Resilience is key - I've seen plenty of brilliant writers give up. If I'm anything, it's resilient - and probably a little bullheaded and stubborn.

In 2017, theatre started to feel particularly suffocating. Tickets now seem to price out those on lower incomes and it feels like more of an exclusive art form. I wanted to make work for everyone, so I turned my attention to television. I headed off to Goldsmith's to do an MA and learn the craft of writing for film and television.

This year I was commissioned by BBC Three and BBC Northern Ireland to write an episode for their series The Break, which showcases new writers. I wrote the episode 'Clean', which is available on i-player now. It's my first piece for television and I'm immensely proud of it!

I am currently based in Northern Ireland, working on a feature film, which explores men's mental health. Mental health in Northern Ireland is at crisis point and I want to use my own experiences to tell an irreverent story of redemption - encouraging people to speak out and end the stigma.

My work aims to explore the most crucial and pertinent social issues of our time. I vehemently believe in theatre, film and television as a vehicle for social change, one that can change hearts and open minds through building empathy, by offering new perspectives and provocations to its audience.

So in a weird, roundabout way, although I never made it through Government and Politics A Level and into the world of politics, I use storytelling as a way to communicate with people, and hopefully, eventually incite structural change.

Mark Bushby (Staff 2005)




