THE AFRICAN PULSE PROJECT – HIV/AIDS PREVENTION IN SCHOOLS

Over the past two years, St Benedict's has been supporting an innovative educational programme which is enhancing prevention and awareness efforts in schools in South Africa. Old Priorian and former Head Boy, Peter Desmond (OP 1973), writes of his work as a Trustee of The African Pulse charity that works to equip children and young people with skills and resources to make informed life choices. St **Benedict's** was delighted to assist.



In South Africa, HIV prevalence continues to rise from a staggering 5.3 million of the population. Such

high rates are attributed to complex social-economic and development issues such as gender roles, deterioration of value systems, unemployment, poor education and health systems and sex work which are all strongly linked to both poverty and South Africa's history of Apartheid.

There is currently inadequate effective teacher training and tools in South African primary schools addressing healthy living and choices in the context of HIV prevention. Despite attempts to inform and engage young people, risky behaviour remains prolific and transmission rates are not being curbed.

New messaging techniques that are educational and embrace the many dynamics of HIV openly are required to improve the school's ability to fulfil its function as a change agent in this crisis. The African Pulse has developed a package of educational resources to assist teachers to deliver effective and accurate messages in an engaging but nonthreatening or stigmatised format in the classroom. An interactive animated CD-ROM, a comic book, an activity book and teacher's guide provides flexible and user-friendly methods of delivering the curriculum and life saving information. The African Pulse works alongside the schools to train teachers in new facilitation techniques, holds workshops on HIV and AIDS and is developing a strategy to directly involve parents and the local school community in the protection and education of their children and themselves.



St. Benedict's School has supported The African Pulse through fundraising events and printing the charity's newsletters. The School's great commitment and provision has been extremely valuable to the charity who have been enabled to further develop their programmes and also benefit from the increased awareness among potential sponsors and volunteers through the newsletter. The African Pulse is very grateful for this continued support.

DOM BERNARD ORCHARD and DOM KEVIN HORSEY R.I.P.



From the Headmasters

In the early hours of Tuesday morning Dom Kevin Horsey died peacefully in his sleep, aged 92. Within the hour Dom Bernard Orchard, aged 96, also died. Both were the only surviving, founding monks of St Benedict's School and were great servants of the School, the parish and the Abbey community. They will be greatly missed.

Dom Bernard's association with St Benedict's is legendary. He was a pupil at Ealing Priory School from the age of 10 and distinguished himself in many ways. He left the School in 1927 and was its first pupil to go to University when he gained a place at Cambridge. Fr Bernard entered monastic life at Downside Abbey in 1932 and

was sent to Ealing to take over the Headship of his own school in 1945. Before he stepped down from the Headship in 1960 he invited the school inspectors in to prepare a report for his successor and in June 1960 they recorded that his contribution had been "outstanding" and that his absence would be "keenly felt". His unshakeable faith in the School's future, his tireless energies and his qualities as a man and a teacher enabled him overcome the day-to-day to difficulties and to keep the School on the course that he had early charted for it.

From 1965 to 1969 he served a second term as Headmaster during which his confidence was undiminished. Apart from his work as a teacher and Headmaster, Dom Bernard was a great scripture scholar and ecumenical activist and his many achievements are too numerous to detail in this letter.



Dom Kevin was born in New York in 1914 and at the age of eight sent to school in England. Ordained a priest in 1941 Dom Kevin was sent to Ealing Priory in 1942. Between 1942 and 1965 he taught Geography and Religion, was a Housemaster and Upper 5th Division Head, commanded the C.C.F. and from 1961 to 1965 was Master in Charge of the Middle School.

Thereafter he transferred to the Parish team and served the district for over 20 years. Dom Kevin founded and was Group Scoutmaster of the 20th Ealing Scouts from 1942-1970. He was awarded the Silver Acorn, the movement's second highest decoration, and the Silver Wolf the Chief Scout's personal award for distinguished services to scouting.

The Requiem Mass for both monks took place in the Abbey Church on Tuesday, 5th December. After the service, in accordance with School tradition, pupils from St Benedict's lined the route from the Abbey Church to the graveyard in the Abbey gardens.

Please remember Dom Bernard, Dom Kevin and all the Monastic Community in your prayers.
